In Year 9 students study a full range of subjects including core and foundation subjects.

In Years 10 and 11 students complete GCSE and BTEC courses. All students study a core curriculum which is complemented by a wide range of level 2 option subjects.

We continually review the option subjects which we offer to our students to allow every student to follow a pathway which is appropriate for their needs and future aspirations and allows them to continue with us into the Sixth Form.





The Arts

The Arts at QE School are highly valued and we strongly believe in creativity throughout the curriculum – the arts subjects and extra-curricular programme are a reflection of this commitment.





The Arts at QE are prolific, of excellent quality and well-respected and the fundamental belief that every student has diverse skills and talents is at the core of the provision.

Students in Year 9 have lessons in Art, Drama, Dance and Music alongside the broad range of arts opportunities in our extra-curricular programme.

There is then the progression route into GCSE or equivalent in all these subjects as well as the introduction of Media Studies. At Sixth Form, students can continue with these, with the basket of qualifications being added to, with BTEC Performing Arts and A level Music. Lessons are taught by an experienced team of subject specialists, many of whom are practising artists in their own right.

All members of the school community comment on the impact of the house system and vertical tutoring. This contributes to the sense of 'family' and to pupils feeling known and valued.



Beyond the Curriculum



We encourage students to be involved in the wider life of the school and the extra-curricular provision allows students to develop a variety of interests, relationships and skills. Each faculty within the school delivers a number of activities both at lunchtime and after school.

The PE Department delivers a number of sports including Hockey, Swimming, Badminton and Netball, as well as Adapted Sports, Fitness and Dance. There are opportunities to partake in Outdoor Education and to work towards the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

We encourage students to be involved in the wider life of the school. The extra-curricular provision allows students to develop a variety of interests, relationships and skills.

We are our own admissions authority and administer all our in year admissions and appeals. Initial admissions are dealt with by Dorset Council.



SAFEGUARDING & WELLBEING

Our first priority is your child's safety and wellbeing. At QE we recognise that students may need additional support linked to their wellbeing. In order to help meet their needs with regards to the challenges of adolescent life, we work closely with several agencies as well as having our own support within school. We have two trained counsellors who work with the Heads of Houses to support students within school.

From September 2022 we have had an NHS Mental Health Support Team (MHST) in school. The programme has NHS funded mental health practitioners on site working with young people. They also provide a programme of workshops throughout the year. This includes support for things like mild-moderate anxiety or worries, exam stress and friendship issues of low intensity Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (LI-CBT), counselling sessions, themed group work or information workshops. They will also support transition between schools and with the Year 8 students going up into Year 9.

We also work closely with external mental health charities including Dorset Mind to promote a "Whole School Approach to Mental Health programme". This work includes workshops with students, staff and parents to look at further ways to support all stakeholders in improving mental health.

We will usually discuss any concerns we might have about your child with you. There might be occasions, however, when we have to provide information to or consult other agencies such as Social Care and Health before we contact you. Our responsibility to do so is determined by Bournemouth, Dorset and Poole Inter-Agency Child Protection Procedures. If you want to know more about these procedures, please speak to the Headteacher or the School's Designated Safeguarding Lead for Child Protection and Safeguarding.

SEX & RELATIONSHIPS EDUCATION

Curriculum for Life (PSHE) Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education is a subject which is delivered through our Curriculum for Life programme across all year groups through led lessons as well as across the curriculum and through a programme of focus days and our collective workshop approach to assemblies and extended opportunities.

Pupils develop the knowledge, skills and qualities required to manage their lives, now and in the future. These skills and characteristics help pupils to stay healthy, safe and prepare them for life and work in modern Britain.

The Curriculum for Life programme removes many barriers to learning experienced by pupils, significantly improving their capacity to learn and achieve. The programme makes a significant contribution to pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural (SMSC) development, their behaviour and safety and the school's statutory responsibility to promote pupils' well-being through RSE.

It covers a broad range of trust wide topics related to health, relationships and the wider world, which all promote wellbeing and future opportunities. Students are supported in exploring a variety of issues that affect them in school and the wider world, with a strong emphasis on staying safe and making positive contributions to society.

To ensure expert, up to date input on key issues, outside agencies are invited into school to deliver some of the off-timetable sessions. We also seek the advice and guidance of our students and parents/carers in auditing our approach and then for setting the programme for the following academic year.

Parents do have the right to withdraw their children from all or part of Sex and Relationships Education, except for those parts included in the statutory National Curriculum for Science. Any parent considering the withdrawal of their child should contact the Headteacher.

However, the school endeavours to work with parents to ensure that it is delivering Sex and Relationships Education in a way that they support.

This area of the curriculum is carried out in line with the school policy for Sex and Relationships Education, which has been ratified by the Academy Committee. A copy of the full policy is available on request.

TRAVELLING TO & FROM SCHOOL

Whilst students are travelling to and from school, they are representing Queen Elizabeth's School. We view them as ambassadors and will expect the highest standard of behaviour at all times.

Cycling

If a student cycles to school we expect them to ensure that they wear a safety helmet. It is also the student's responsibility to make sure that their bicycle is securely locked in one of the school bicycle sheds (we recommend a D lock).

Buses

Students may only travel on the bus which is allocated to them by Damory and printed on their pass. They must carry their bus passes at all times and for all journeys. This is a provision of the contract with Dorset Council and is a safety measure to ensure that buses are not overcrowded.

If a student does not have their pass, the driver may refuse to take them on the bus.

Inappropriate behaviour on any of the school buses will be reported to the school and Dorset Council. Offenders may lose their right to travel on the bus, as well as being subject to punitive measures in line with the school behaviour policy.

Walking to school

- Students should walk on the inside of the pavement
- To cross the road students should use pedestrian crossings
- Students should take care of their own safety and be alert to the dangers of traffic at all times
- Students should be considerate to other road users and pedestrians

Travelling to school by car

The Queen Elizabeth's School site is particularly busy at the beginning and end of the school day, with a large amount of traffic accessing and leaving the campus.

Therefore we request that if a student is brought to school by car; that they are dropped off in the car park at the side of the Leisure Centre. This should also be the point of collection at the end of the school day. Due to the volume of buses in the car park at the front of school, it is not possible to safely accommodate cars collecting students. We also request that car users do not wait in any of our neighbouring roads.

Every Minute Matters

Smoking

Queen Elizabeth's School is a no smoking and vaping site and a no smoking policy is in place for all members of the school community; staff, students or visitors. Students are not allowed to smoke on the school site or whilst travelling to and from school. All smoking sanctions also apply to e-cigarettes.

Drugs in School

The possession or use of any form of illicit drug on our site is forbidden.

Any student found in possession of drugs (including alcohol) or solvents, or making use of them, or inviting another student to do so, faces immediate exclusion from the school.

The Police will always be informed about an incident involving the use of, or possession of illegal substances.

Mobile Phones

If students possess a mobile phone, they will be expected to keep them switched off and in bags during the school day.

Punctuality

Any student who arrives at school after tutor time has finished (9.20am) should report to the House Office and sign in. This is a legal requirement. Once this has been done, students must then go straight to their lessons.





BEHAVIOUR

At Queen Elizabeth's School we strive for the best behaviour and encourage all of our members, staff and students to be the very best they can. Expectations around behaviour are very high as we want all of our members to feel safe and secure and have the opportunity to grow and learn in a calm and safe environment. All of this is also built on our strong Christian foundation and **Vision of Hope**. It is our **hope** that all are behaving correctly and displaying the highest standards, both in school and when representing the school. We believe in a culture of rewards and support and we hope to be able to model the highest standards at all times and recognise those that keep to these standards on a regular basis.

REWARDS

At Queen Elizabeth's School we strive for the best behaviour and encourage all of our members, staff and students to be the very best they can. For those students that demonstrate the very best behaviour and performance in all areas QE has an extensive rewards system. Built on strong Christian foundations of **hope**, QE has a culture of praise and reward, ensuring motivation and a continued strive towards achieving the very best in all areas.

UNIFORM POLICY

Please note the following information is given to assist in your preparation for your son or daughter joining Queen Elizabeth's School in a successful manner.

A school uniform is worn by members of Years 9-11 to:-

- create a sense of identity
- promote and maintain a business-like working environment
- present a favourable image in the community
- minimise pressure to conform to the vagaries of fashion
- provide access to good quality uniform at reasonable prices

The uniform consists of a navy blue blazer with the school badge, a school tie, a navy blue and white striped shirt or blouse, navy blue QE specific school style trousers or skirts for girls and black suit style trousers for boys (not jean type). Shoes are to be black leather look in style and suitable for a day in an adult learning environment. Please note training shoes are not permitted. We do expect blazers to be worn at all times. However, in the event of extremely warm weather, the Headteacher will advise whether blazers need to be worn. Students must wear their house lanyard and ID cards at all times when on the school site. Full details are published on our website.

Coats

Coats should be plain, of a sensible style and without slogans and worn outside of the school building only. Please note that "hoodies" are not an acceptable part of our school uniform at any time.

Shoes

School shoes should be black leather look in style shoes. No sandals or trainers at all. Leather 'Vans', Airforce Ones or canvas shoes are not permitted.. This applies to all students unless they have a note from a doctor/ physiotherapist/ other medical professional to say they cannot wear school shoes.

Jewellerv

Students are only allowed to wear two plain discreet studs per ear. No other visible piercings are allowed including nose studs. Any jewellery that does not conform to the school's uniform code will be confiscated, passed to the House Office and returned after a period of time to be decided by the school. Persistent offenders will face appropriate sanctions.

Hair styles

No extremes of colour or style are acceptable. For the avoidance of doubt, it is the Headteacher who will define what is extreme. Hair accessories should be in blue or black.

Sixth Form Appearance

The way we present ourselves each day is an obvious sign of our intention and resolve to work hard for and with each other and to be our best in our learning and everything else that we do. Therefore, as role models and leaders of our student community, QE Sixth Formers are expected to dress and act in a smart and confident manner. This means that they should not wear untidy, immodest or revealing clothes. The following appearance policy allows for individual choice of appearance in keeping with the above principles ensuring students are appropriately dressed for learning in a school environment.

The appearance policy has been developed by our Student Management Team and Sixth Form Student Focus Group. The policy aims to not be unduly restrictive or inhibit students in dressing in ways in which they feel comfortable and how they wish to present themselves as maturing young adults in a working environment. In order to dress in a suitable manner for learning in a school, QE Sixth Form students must adhere to the following:



- No clothing with logos or wording that may be considered offensive.
- No overly revealing clothes or tops that reveal stomachs or cleavage.
- No clothing which reveals underwear of any description.
- No hats on or hoods up at any time in the school building.
- No open-toed footwear.
- No ripped jeans.
- No skirts or dresses shorter than mid-thigh length.
- No swimming/beachwear style shorts shorts should be smart/tailored and at least mid-thigh length.
- No extreme hairstyles or bright colours

 with exception to authorised charitable causes.
- No bright, extreme or excessive make-up.
- No facial piercings. Clear stud retainers are permitted.
- Thick/non revealing leggings are acceptable.
- Ear piercings are acceptable however, no more than 3 small studs/rings per ear.
- Ear phones and mobile phones are acceptable for educational use when directed by a member of staff or when in use in the designated Sixth Form areas
- Students must wear their house lanyard and ID cards at all times when on the school site.
- Students will participate in a scheduled 'smart day' (office professional style clothing) once a term to help raise money for designated Sixth Form and House charities.

CURRICULUM STRUCTURE

In the main school students are based in teaching panels. In Year 9 students have their lessons in 3 teaching groups based on their house as a teaching panel. In Year 9 there are 2 panels Q and E. In Years 10 and 11 there are 3 panels per year group - Q, E and S. In Years 10 and 11 students follow a core curriculum which is taught in teaching panels together with three option subjects.

SIXTH FORM STUDY AND EXAMPLE PATHWAYS

During their time in the Sixth Form students will study three subjects and an enrichment subject. Students follow one of three pathways that we have within school. Some students will choose to study four subjects. We offer a wide range of over 40 subjects in the Sixth Form as well as 13 enrichment options. In addition to the subject offer there are numerous opportunities including trips, visits and external speakers to support students with future destinations as well as day-to-day finance. Throughout their time in the Sixth Form students are able to become part of the Student Management Team and Team QE, representing the school at events and in the community, further developing their leadership skills.

ADVANCED PATHWAY:

Entry requirements: Five GCSE Grade 6+ ideally including English and Maths with individual subject requirements.

Example: a student wanting to study Medicine; they could choose Biology, Chemistry with Maths or Physics and additionally Further Maths at A Level. They could then choose an EPQ for extra UCAS points or Work Experience Enrichment in a medical setting.

MIXED PATHWAY:

Entry requirements: Five GCSE Grade 5+ ideally including English and Maths.

Example: a student wanting to pursue a career in Law; they could choose relevant A Levels subject to individual requirements from History, Politics, English, Economics, a language and then single award Applied Law. They could then choose an Enrichment such as Work Experience, MOOCs or EPQ to supplement their academic subjects.

PROFESSIONAL PATHWAY:

Entry requirements: Five GCSE Grade 4+ ideally including English and Maths with individual subject requirements.

Example: a student wanting to study Sports Coaching or Sports performance could choose a Double BTEC National Diploma in Sport with a Single BTEC in Business. They could then choose an Enrichment such as Sports Leaders, Duke of Edinburgh or apply for the Junior Athlete Education programme if they perform and commit significant hours to training and competing in sports.
